department, Ms. Ketut Gita Ayu.



Indonesian people across the archipelago have done a lot to ensure Batik is widely perceived as Indonesian, including holding ceremonies and exhibitions, and providing studies and workshops about batik.

BINUS International believes it is important for the school to do it's share for Indonesia's cultural heritage by promoting batik. On June 5, the university held a talk show by Nurul Akriliyati, S.Sn., a batik observer and a lecturer of Fashion Fabric at BINUS Northumbria School of Design (BNSD). The topic of the talk show was "Old Coast: Appreciating the Historical Value of the Archipelago through its Fabric".

The talk show was part of a series called "Coloring Your Knowledge" held at the Library and Knowledge Center (LKC) from June 3-5 at BINUS International.

Having observed and studied batik since high school, Nurul seemed to enjoy sharing her vast knowledge about the beauty of batik, discussing her personal batik collections, and deepening the participants' understanding of coastal batik. "Coastal batik usually has a head and a body. The head of the batik has more complicated patterns and striking colors. An unusual thing about this batik is that many of the patterns have the signatures of the makers, such as Oey Ping Hien, Oey Soe Tjoen, Mv. E Van Zuylen and many others," explained Nurul.

The participants took the opportunity to experience batik making at first hand during a demo session led by the Kampung Palbatu School of Batik instructors.

"The activity was aimed to widen Binus International students' horizons, especially those of BINUS Northumbria School of Design (BNSD) on batik and photography," explained the head of LKC, Imam Budi Presetiawan, S.S., who was the Coordinating Leader for the Coloring your Knowledge program. (RAW)






BINUS-ASO School of Engineering Arrives in the Midst of Technologically Advanced Robots

Youth undergo physical and psychological changes that can place them in a fragile condition during the processes of growth and puberty. 




The Power of Kinship



BIPEDS WIN

The Oldest Debating Competition in Indonesia

THE BINUS INTERNATIONAL POOL OF ENGLISH DEBATERS (BIPEDS) EMERGED AS THE CHAMPIONS AT THE 18TH JAVA OVERLAND VARSITIES ENGLISH DEBATE (JOVED) 2014, WHICH WAS HELD AT UNIVERSITAS PGRI, SEMARANG. Melisa Irene, Wilson Salim and Gierdino Julian, BI's A team, made their campus proud by beating the team from *Universitas Brawijaya*, Malang in the final round. This is the first time that BIPEDS have won the oldest parliamentary debating competition between Indonesian universities.

The competition has been dominated by universities coming from West and Central Java. *Universitas Brawijaya* was represented very well by Zelly Sidi Zamzami, Nadya Ayunin and M. Fahri Akbar, but during the intense final round BIPEDS made

a more convincing argument on the topic of how television stations may favor certain political parties during elections.

This success strengthens the position of BIPEDS as a true national debating powerhouse. In the last six years, they have won many well-known debating competitions, such as Varsities English Debate (2013) and the National Universities Debating Championships (2011 and 2013). The siblings, Melisa Irene and Wilson Salim, were also regarded as the best speakers in the JOVED competition. (RAW)

The 1st IFRS Workshop in Indonesia



THE WORLD IS AIMING TO INSTALL

WITH THE INTERNATIONAL FINANCIAL
REPORTING STANDARD (IFRS)
AS THE BASIS.

In order to help accounting teachers deliver IFRS teaching in Indonesia, BINUS International worked with the IFRS Foundation in arranging a workshop, which was held on July 2nd 2014 at the JWC campus. The presenters, from the International Accounting Standard Board, were Darrel Scott (Board Member) and Michael Wells (Director, IFRS Education Initiative).

This workshop was important because Indonesia has adopted the IFRS standards and there have been few IFRS-related workshops organized for accounting teachers, leading them to teach IFRS with a regulation-oriented approach rather than IFRS's standard principle-based approach. The IFRS workshop calibrated the teaching methods of accounting teachers to meet IFRS standards.

"This workshop for IFRS teachers is the first in Indonesia and was a rare and valuable opportunity," said Dewi Fitriasari, Ph.D, CSRS, CMA (Head of School, Accounting & Finance, BINUS INTERNATIONAL). (RAW)

TODAY, WAR IS CONSIDERED BY MANY TO BE NO LONGER NECESSARY. WHERE INTERNATIONAL LAWS ARE MADE TO REGULATE THE RELATIONSHIPS BETWEEN COUNTRIES, INTERNATIONAL ORGANIZATIONS CLOSELY ENFORCE AND OBSERVE THE PRACTICE OF THE LAWS. HOWEVER, THERE ARE STILL MANY THINGS THAT MODERN WARS HAVE INHERITED FROM CONVENTIONAL WARS AND COUNTRIES NEED TO BE PREPARED.

This issue was brought up in the ninth IR Lecture Series with Major Agus Harimurti Yudhoyono, M.Sc., MPA, in a seminar organized by the International Relations department of BINUS University. The topic of the seminar was "The Legacy of Modern Warfare: Technology Advancement vs Boots on the Ground," and was held on May 5th at the Joseph Wibowo Center.

Agus, the eldest son of President Susilo Bambang Yudhoyono, also lectures at Universitas Pertahanan. He shared information about theories of war, his experience in the battlefield, and his views on whether there is a need for war as well as how to deal with conflicts when they happen.

Whether we are prepared or not, war may happen again in the future. What kind of war it is or who the actors will be cannot be predetermined.

"One thing for sure, rivalry between countries involves military power, but just being strong and smart will not be enough. Being adaptive is the most important mindset that we need to develop in facing the competition between countries," he stated.

At the end of the seminar, Agus thanked the International Relations department for its impressive IR Lecture Series. "Although they have only been around for two years, to be able to make an event like this is amazing. The people who are invited are important figures. I hope International Relations can always produce great students for the sake of the country and the people," he said. (RAW)







IN ORDER TO SHARE INFORMATION ABOUT HUMAN RESOURCES, BINUS UNIVERSITY HOSTED HR GATHERING 2014 ON JULY 17. WITH THE THEME OF "HUMAN CAPITAL TRANSFORMATION", THE PRESENTER WAS HERIYANTO AGUNG PUTRA, DIRECTOR OF HUMAN CAPITAL AND CORPORATE AFFAIRS, GARUDA INDONESIA.



Unfortunately, F.X. Sri Martono, Chief of Corporate Human Capital Development of Astra International could not present as intended. However, the news did not diminish the enthusiasm of the forty HR staff members from various national and international companies gathered at the Atlet Century Hotel in Senayan.

Tubagus Hanafi Soeriaatmadja, MM, MBA, Program Director of MM Executive at BINUS Business School, served as the moderator. The event began with an opening speech by Dr. Ir. Boto Simatupang MBP, Vice Rector Global Employability & Entrepreneurship BINUS University.

"Right now, companies are faced with a new challenge, which is to build up a brand for the youth, who are often not aware of well-known companies. Here at BINUS, we do not only produce knowledge, but we also produce talent, so that we can be a close partner to the industry," said Boto.

















Heriyanto Putra shared the story of how Garuda Indonesia became one of the best airlines in the region, largely due to changes in HR management. He emphasized the importance of human resources playing its role as a machine that moves the firm, as he presented his paper: "Improving Corporate Performance Through Human Capital Transformation".

Heryanto admitted that HR issues had become a challenge for Garuda, and stated that readiness is the key in answering all challenges.

"All companies have their own HR challenges. Garuda's is to find the best pilots. Since they are the most crucial element in a flight industry. It is never easy to find pilots who can meet our standards," said Heryanto.

To tackle this challenge, Heryanto's team has developed a flight school. With its own flight school, Garuda can prepare pilots to meet the expectations of the company and also scout for great pilots outside the company.

Heryanto explained the two main challenges in HR management.
The first is within the company itself, such as corporate culture and orientation. The second is the area in which the company operates, such as regulations and the economy of the country.

"The issues of human resources that change from time to time are the matters of talent and leadership, engagement behavior and HR Analytics. Therefore, there are at least three things that we need to focus on: people, process and technology," said Heryanto. (RAW)

Exploring Street Food Stalls in Jakarta

DISHES ARE AVAILABLE TO THOSE WHO ENJOY TASTY
FOOD. THE GROWING NUMBER OF RESTAURANTS ENSURES
DIVERSITY, BUT THERE IS ONE SIGNATURE CULINARY
EXPERIENCE IN JAKARTA THAT IS CONSTANT: STREET FOOD.

Street food is a staple of many cultures, and several countries hold festivals that highlight street food. Jakarta holds yearly food festivals in many places, such as Pecenongan, Bendungan Hilir, Sabang and various shopping centers. Street food vendors can be found almost anywhere in Jakarta, some of whom have been around for decades. Often, particular stalls have historical value that causes diners to reminisce about old times.

Young people in Jakarta have a great appetite for street food, despite the lack of sofas or air conditioning. Some of Jakarta's most popular stalls include:



Soto & Sate Apjay is located in front of Apotik Jaya (hence the name), in Panglima Polim, South Jakarta. For years, this place has been a top choice for connoisseurs. Its signature dishes are soto ceker, soto ayam, soto ranjau, sate kambing, sate ayam and sate telur muda, a rare dish that is difficult to find elsewhere. Prices range from Rp 10,000 to 35,000 and it is open from 5pm to 2am. If you're craving a light snack, they also have roasted corn and toast.



The Santa region near Blok S is another culinary heaven in South Jakarta with many street food vendors. The standout stall is *Sate Padang Ajo Ramon*, famous for his thick meat and Minang sauce glazes, which have caused his customers such divine pleasure since the 1980s.



Established in 1958, this place is famous for its mutton fried rice and is known as a must-try street food experience for fried rice enthusiasts.

Nasi Goreng Kebon Sirih was founded in 1958 by the late H. Nein and is one of the most popular culinary experiences in Jakarta. It is located in Jalan Kebon Sirih, Central Jakarta. Their legendary mutton fried rice is only Rp 23,000 per portion.



Located in the heart of Jakarta, Pecenongan is a popular place to dine, especially after the sun sets. Some recommendations include *Martabak* 65A, which sells Nutella-filled *martabak*, and *Restoran Kwang Tung*, with its incredible porridges.

Street food is ubiquitous in Jakarta, so there is always more to explore and enjoy! (RAW)
